## **THE FUND AWARDS \$79,000 IN GRANTS**

More than \$132,000 raised since summer 2009

The Tomorrow Fund has awarded \$79,000 in grants to eight North Carolina colleges for the benefit of Hispanic students from low-income families. The grants will help to bridge students' financial aid gaps.

**Appalachian State University, Central Carolina Community College, Davidson College, High Point University\*, Lenoir-Rhyne University, Meredith College\*, North Carolina A & T\*, and Salem College** will receive grants at varying levels. (\*indicates 2nd year of grants). Congratulations to these schools and their recipients!

The grants were made based in part on a college's successful recruitment, enrollment and graduation rates of Hispanic/Latino students. Colleges also must provide some level of institutional funding or assistance to each student; we want them to also be invested in these students. Colleges complete a Request for Funding Proposal and a grant committee of The Tomorrow Fund reviews the applications, and in some cases further questions are posed by email or telephone call. Colleges are notified in early June.

During the Fund's first year, \$39,000 worth of grants were made and three schools were funded. All of last year's student recipients, except for one, are re-enrolled for fall 2011 at their respective schools.

### From the Founder:

The Tomorrow Fund exists because of people like you who believe in the importance of post-secondary education for Latino immigrants from low income families. Every cent donated is allocated to the grants we make! Any costs associated with the fund (such as printing, mailing) are underwritten by a donor.
